

- > Assist people to gain self-sufficiency through upskilling
- Post-secondary education or experiential learning
- > One-on-one career planning, identify a career goal, reduce barriers
- > All programs:
 - Must be citizen or eligible to work in the US
 - Reside in the service area
 - Registered with Selective Service if required






Title I - Adult Program Eligibility

Adult Program eligibility:

- > Low income and basic skills deficient
- ➤ Needs assistance becoming self-sufficient

Title I Career Planner will have more details on eligibility







Title I - Dislocated Worker Program Eligibility

- > Terminated, laid off, or has received notice of termination or layoff
- > Eligible for unemployment or has exhausted unemployment benefits
- > Unlikely to return to previous occupation







Title I - Youth Program

Youth In-School:

- ➤ 14 21 years old
- Low-income AND:
 - Basic skills deficient
 - > Attending ELL classes
 - Justice-involved
 - > Foster care or aged out
 - Pregnant or parenting
 - Documented disability

Youth Out of School

- ➤ 16 24 years old
- Not attending any school
- Basic skills deficient
- ➤ Attending ELL or HiSET classes
- Justice-involved
- Homeless
- > Foster care or aged out
- Pregnant or parenting
- Documented disability





Title I - What makes a good enrollment?

- Eligible for programing

Title II - Adult Basic Education

English Language Learner:

- Designed to move beginners to solid intermediate level proficiency
- Skills include listening, speaking, reading and writing

High School Equivalency (HiSET):

- > Education comparable to a high school graduate
- Alternative for those who never finished high school
- ➤ HiSET replaced the GED as Iowa's method of providing high school equivalency

Both programs expect a student to attend 2-4 days a week and commit to completing homework outside of class





Title III - Wagner-Peyser

Named for the congressional act that created American Job Centers Focused on basic employment skills:

- Veterans Services
- Career pathway research
- Resume and interview skills
- Unemployment assistance
- IowaWORKS.gov Iowa's largest job bank

Wagner-Peyser services available to all with minimal application process






Title IV - Vocational Rehabilitation

Known as Voc-Rehab or IVRS

For those who require assistance to get or maintain employment

 Includes both Iowa Vocational Rehabilitation Services and the Iowa Department for the Blind







Title IV - Iowa Vocational Rehabilitation Services

- Must have a mental or physical impairment which is an impediment
- ➤ Needs services to obtain, maintain, or advance in employment
- Can provide job placement, training or other job services
- Social Security benefits counseling
- > Job coaching, transportation assistance, vehicle and workplace modifications
- > Technological aids and devices





Title IV - Iowa Department for the Blind


- For those who are blind, legally blind or visually impaired
- Can provide career counseling and guidance
- > Training assistance, job placement, accommodations
- > Assistive technology, braille displays, screen reader software, magnifiers
- > Other assistance, tailored to the customer








Iowa Skills Jobs vs. Labor
