



### lowa and U.S. Unemployment Rates - 2024



- lowa's unemployment rate remained at 2.8 percent in July.
- The state's total employment level decreased to 1,638,000 in July from 1,641,600 in June.
- The U.S. unemployment rate increased to 4.3 percent in July.

# Number of Individuals Receiving Unemployment Insurance Benefits (July) •



- The number of persons receiving unemployment insurance (UI) benefits payments increased by 5,292 from 11,138 in July 2023 to 16,430 in July 2024.
- The benefit recipient series dates back to 1996. The last four years have been the four lowest July benefit recipient counts in the history of the series.
- The highest July recipient counts were 148,469 in July 2020 (pandemic) and 73,860 in July 2009 (the great recession).

- Total nonfarm employment shed jobs in July (-1,500). This decline was the third drop in the last four months.
- Professional and business services lost the most jobs of any sector (-1,000).
   Administrative support and waste management fueled most of this decline (-700).
- Manufacturing pared 800 jobs since June. Animal slaughtering and processing firm losses more than offset hiring from durable goods factories.
- Construction shed 400 jobs in July and is now down 3,100 jobs from a recent high in March.
- Health care and social assistance gained the most jobs in July (+800). Hiring was concentrated in nursing and residential care facilities.
- Since last July, lowa establishments added 19,200 jobs to payrolls. Education and health care added the most jobs (+10,000). Losses have been highest in trade and transportation (-1,800) and manufacturing (-1,500).
- Nationally, establishments gained 114,000 in July. Health care has added the most jobs (+55,000) followed by construction (+25,000).
