



Iowa and U.S. Unemployment Rates-2023



- lowa's unemployment rate increased to 3.3 percent in November. The state's jobless rate was 3.1 percent one year ago.
- The state's total unemployment level increased to 57,200 in November from 56,000 in October.
- The U.S. unemployment rate decreased to 3.7 percent in November.


Average Weekly Benefit for Regular UI vs. Average Weekly Wage for UI Covered Employment



- The 2022 average weekly benefit for regular UI was \$460. The 2022 average weekly wage for UI covered employment was \$1,100. The average benefit has been running at about 41 percent of the average wage.
- The exception was 2020 when the pandemic resulted in more layoffs in lower wage industries. This caused the average weekly benefit to drop in 2020.

- Businesses added 4,700 jobs in November. This increase is the second consecutive gain with 7,300 jobs added since September.
- Construction firms added 1,800 jobs and gained 3,100 jobs in the last three months.
 Prior to this, construction had layoffs and shown weakness over the summer months.
- Education and health care advanced by 1,500. Most of the hiring was related to health care and social assistance.
- Financial activities added jobs (+1,000). Insurance carriers and related activities helped fuel this increase (+400).
- Professional and business services shed the most jobs in November (-1,000).
 Administrative support and waste management fueled the declines.
- Over the past twelve months, 10,300 jobs have been added to lowa payrolls. Health care and social assistance have added the most jobs (+8,500) followed by manufacturing (+3,000). Conversely, professional and business services have pared the most jobs of an sector (-7,400).
- Nationally, the U.S. gained 199,000 jobs in November. The largest gains were in health care (+77,000) and government (49,000), and manufacturing (+28,000).
